### **Travel Reminders**



Please remember to communicate travel plans to Ben Brannon, Social Services Coordinator, or Kasey Penrod, Social Services Assistant, at least one week in advance, but more notice is appreciated, if we will need to transport a resident in any way, i.e. airport, bus station, meeting

place, etc. This will enable us to arrange staffing, prepare doctor letters, medication, and any other items needed. We need at least a 3 to 5 day notice in order for Nursing to make sure they have enough medication on hand.

We also need at least one business day notice if you plan to visit your loved one at the facility so necessary arrangements can be made.

All travel arrangements and visits to GLOW House should also be arranged with Ben or Kasey. It is important to remember that there are only two staff working at GLOW House. We will need to have advance notice if we will need to transport the resident in any way.

## 50th Anniversary Celebrations

We have had several residents celebrate their 50th Anniversary of living at Mount Aloysius. We have asked families to share their stories of their loved ones. In this edition, Don Amrine and Bob Hotze will be highlighted.

Don Amrine (Submitted by Mary Amrine)



My earliest memory of realizing the differences in my big brothers' schools was in 1959; I was 3 years old. My mother and I went to each brother's school to pick them up for a doctor's appointment. At Don's school we were led to the top floor of the school in a dark hallway of steps by a woman with a flashlight. She explained they did not turn on the lights because they were afraid of an electrical fire. The teacher was laying across her desk (drunk), and there was no control in the classroom with 1 guy running around the room. This was a very scary place. During this time, I found out later; that the 'Mentally Retarded' schools were only supported by the funds raised by the MRDD Counsel. This counsel was made up mainly of the parents of the Developmentally Disabled Children. They had to settle for poorly trained teachers, often unsafe schools, and limited supplies due to no support from the state or city.

In the mid 60's Don started school at the Day Program at Saint Martins in downtown Columbus only a few blocks from Grant Hospital. It was started by the Brothers' of the Good Shepherd. Classes were structured and included music. Don became happier and enjoyed going to school. He was treated with respect for the first time. Due to safety the Bishop of the Dioceses of Columbus wanted the school to be moved out of the inner city of Columbus. The brothers bought Saint Aloysius with a drive for money that the parents and community committed to. They changed the name to Mount Aloysius. It was a safer, quieter, and more spacious environment. I remember Don brought a suitcase to my parents, so they knew he wanted to move with them in November of 1969. After the move, Don and the other guys were much calmer, happier and more communicative. They had more freedom with supervision. In the 1960s and 1970s it was recognized that little was done to advance the rights of developmentally disabled children. Legislation occurred which ensured that these children had educational opportunities as well as recognizing the need for special education.

Mount Aloysius may be considered an Intermediate Care Facility by the state agencies but in my mind, it is a home filled with love and dignity for the guys. Every staff member consistently shows compassion, protectiveness and love all the time to not only the residents but to their families. Their focus is to keep the guys happy, and all their needs met. All therapies (Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Speech Therapy), Social Worker on site, DSPs, supervisors, dietician and dietary support, care givers and maintenance staff are readily available. They provide different events, outings, and fun all the time even if it is on the grounds. They help these special men stay in contact with their families during this crazy pandemic by FaceTime, doing videos and calls which has helped with the separation I and others have felt during this unique aspect of our lives.

The Nursing Staff are truly the best. They recognize needs quickly and communicate them to the medical staff as well as the family. Since my brother has had a decline in his health, they are always willing to take my suggestions as well as alleviate my fears. I have been a Registered Nurse for 41 years and can be critical especially since I am my brother's voice as well as his little sister. I truly feel we are blessed to have each of them working and caring for all the guys at Mount Aloysius.

Don has grown into a much happier man who feels the love by all the staff and guys. He has available to him programs specific to his needs. He is always anxious to get back. I have found out that he often enjoys things at the Mount that he will not at our home. (Pizza parties for example). Don is very aware of his rights at the Mount even though he has the I.Q. of about a 3- to 5-year-old. All his angels of care make sure he is aware of them and have reminded me when I say "In our family no one has rights". He will burst out laughing. Every day I thank God for providing my brother with such a wonderful place as Mount Aloysius and the entire staff who treat the guys like family.

#### Bob Hotze (submitted by Linda Williams, sister & guardian)



My little brother, Bobby was born when I was 6 years old. The grown-ups were very worried. They said he was pre-mature. Our mother came home from the hospital without him. She went back to the hospital every day to feed him. I couldn't go with her to see him. Our family was sad.

When Bobby came home, he cried all the time. He must have been hurting. Time passed before I could hold him. He stayed a baby for a very long time. He should have grown into a toddler by now. Gleefully frolicking about the house. Sometimes our mother let me play with him in his room. I sang along to his record player, and read stories to him. I played his toy piano. He just stared. Later, the doctor said he was having seizures, and placed him on medication.

Bobby wasn't ready for kindergarten by the age of 5. Or 6. There were very few schools for DD children in those days, so our mother started one. By this time, I was 12, and helped care for my brother, Bobby. He needed someone to bathe him, and help him eat his food. He went to speech therapy, and I tried to help him learn to talk. We worked puzzles, played games, and read stories together. I walked him to the park, and played ball with him.

Bobby was 12 when I left home to get married. As he grew larger, and became increasingly mobile, our parents had difficulty keeping up with him. My husband and I offered to welcome him into our home. Bobby had a good heart, and a gentle spirit. But his behavior required "eyes on" 24/7. Our parents declined this offer.

Our parents looked for a placement where Bobby would receive kind, loving treatment and care. Our family worked with Bobby every day. We tried to teach him as much as he could possibly learn. We wanted him to continue to receive the daily attention he received at home. The Brothers at Mount Aloysius offered this loving care to us.

As years went by, our parents volunteered at Mount Aloysius, and donated funds. They did everything possible to help Mount Aloysius become the modern facility it is today. They are gone, now. As their daughter, I thank you on their behalf. I know Bobby is thankful. I can see the sparkle in his eyes. He loves camping, fishing, swimming, and working at PERCO. Mount Aloysius has provided Bobby with "a life worth living". I thank God for all of you!







## **Family Satisfaction Survey Results**
